Dear Mr. Stern:

This is the Department of the Treasury's final response to your Freedom of Information Act (FOIA) request dated July 11, 2011, in which you request "all documents that contain, discuss, refer or relate to any legal opinion or analysis by the Treasury Department General Counsel, or any attorney thereof, of Section Four of the Fourteenth Amendment (also known as the Public Debt Clause), or any application or potential application of Section Four to the statutory debt limit."

I am releasing 432 pages in full or in part, and I am withholding 323 pages in full. The information being withheld is protected from disclosure under the FOIA pursuant to 5 U.S.C. §§ 552(b)(5) and (b)(6). Exemption 5 pertains to certain inter- and intra-agency communications protected by the deliberative process privilege. Exemption 6 concerns records or information the disclosure of which would constitute a clearly unwarranted invasion of personal privacy. In addition, for certain published materials (e.g. books, law review articles), I am releasing only the cover page of the published item.

If you are dissatisfied with the Department's action on your request, you may appeal within thirty-five (35) days. Your appeal must be in writing, signed by you or your representative, and should contain the rationale for the appeal. Your appeal should be addressed to: Freedom of Information Appeal, Disclosure Services, DO, Department of the Treasury, Washington, D.C. 20220.
